The worlds we live in are more-than-human, though we sometimes forget that. What can we do to remember this individually and, more importantly, collectively? How can we truly coexist as part of nature, without seeing it as something separate from us and therefore exploitable? What about our relationships with other animals – how to reframe them, away from domination or paternalistic protection?

This event will tackle these topics by way of a focus on the vidoessay form. It will consist of on an introduction about the videoessay by Miriam de Rosa, the screening of three videos resulting, one of which resulting from the activity that brought together MA, Graduate students from Ca' Foscari and the artistic collective "just wondering...", and a themed discussion between Maria Martelli and Federica Timeto, plus a Q&A session.

The screening programme is comprised of "we fly, we crawl, we swim – a short film about climate justice", "Beyond speciesism, beyond humanism, beyond | Dincolo de speciism, dincolo de umanism, dincolo", and the new "Letters to our multispecies kin".
